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### **CHIEF CONSTABLE'S ANNUAL REPORT, 2006-2007**

#### **1 PURPOSE OF REPORT**

- 1.1 This paper and attached documents comprise the Chief Constable's Annual Report which summarises performance during the twelve months ending 31 March 2007. The Report is presented to members in compliance with the Police (Scotland) Act 1967 and copies have also been sent to the Sheriff Principal and Scottish Executive.
- 1.2 The Annual Report should be considered along with 'Delivering on our Platform for Success – 2007', attached, which clarifies the Force's strategic direction for the coming year and includes some of its achievements during the previous year.
- 1.3 The auditors' requirement to provide updates on performance against statutory performance indicators is met within the statistics and in the appendix which presents details for Quarter 4 of the year 06/07 in line with previous quarterly reports submitted to the Joint Police Board.
- 1.4 The statistical information contained in this Report, and the means of accessing more detailed information, is being made available to the public through the Force website. Members are asked to note that comparative statistical information from 2005/06 is based on figures published by Audit Scotland.
- 1.5 A draft of the Force's Annual Accounts is being presented to the June Board meeting. Thereafter they will be made available for public inspection during July and August. Our External Auditors should complete their audit over the summer with a view to having the Accounts presented in their final form to the Board in August and placed on the Force website in September 2007.

#### **2 CRIME AND DETECTION RATES**

- 2.1 **Most significant over the past year was the overall reduction in levels of reported crime and the rise in detections to Force record level.**
- 2.2 There was a 4.2% fall in Groups 1 to 5 crimes (violence, indecency, dishonesty, fire raising, malicious mischief and other crimes including drugs). The total of 39,806 reported crimes /

crimes (41,569 last year) was the lowest figure since the introduction of the Scottish Crime Recording Standard and continued an overall downward trend from 2000 when there were 46,000 reported crimes in Groups 1 to 5.

- 2.3 The 16,615 detected crimes for Groups 1 to 5 represented a record detection rate of 41.7% (38.2% in 05/06, 35.7% in 04/05).
- 2.4 Domestic Housebreaking fell to the Force's lowest ever figure with 1263 reports (1549 previous year) - a reduction of 18.5% - and the 302 detections represented a rise of 3.9 to 23.9%, the highest ever level for the Force.
- 2.5 Detections also improved for Racially Aggravated Crime, rising 5.6 to 59.9% (54.3%) and for Car Crime by 3.8 to 22% (18.2%). Unfortunately, levels of reported Car Crime rose from 3747 in 2005/06 to 4104.

### **3. PERFORMANCE AGAINST NATIONAL TARGETS**

- 3.1 The achievements in section 2 above were among those which exceeded targets set by the Force in relation to the Statutory Performance Indicators (SPIs) for 2006/07. The general target was to be better than the average across the previous three years with an aspiration to improve by 2007/08 on the best performance during the past three years.
- 3.2 The Force achieved its aspirational targets in Groups 1 to 5 detection rates; levels of reported Domestic Housebreaking and their detections; Car Crime detection rate; and Controlled Drug seizures.
- 3.3 There was also a 12% increase in the number of reports submitted to the Procurator Fiscal within 28 days, resulting in the Force exceeding the national target of 80%. The submission time for a report to the Children's Reporter is 10 days. Our performance in relation to this has improved every quarter and stands at 79.5%, close to the national target of 80%.
- 3.4 The Disclosure Unit had a 100% record in meeting the statutory requirement to answer Freedom of Information questions within 20 days – during a year in which there was a 6% rise to 1222 questions in 352 requests. The Unit also met the time targets in responses to requests for subject (2565) and non-subject (214) access information, despite increases of and 18% and 122% respectively.
- 3.5 The 353 complaints recorded (including complaints against the police and service delivery issues) was an increase of 19% on 2005/2006 and a three year high. This figure still seems quite modest when seen against the 172,958 Command and Control incidents recorded during 2006/2007. An analysis is on-going to seek a more informed position on the level of last year's complaints.

### **4. WORKING WITHIN THE CONTROL STRATEGY**

- 4.1 Grampian has been at the forefront of implementing the National Intelligence Model which includes /

includes the requirement to conduct a strategic assessment of crime and disorder. This assessment produced a Control Strategy which sets the long term priorities for crime prevention, intelligence and enforcement opportunities.

- 4.2 Over the past year, the Control Strategy addressed the following priorities - Community Well-being, Controlled Drugs, Road Casualty Reduction, National Security, Child Protection and Sex Offenders, Serious and Violent Crime.

### **Community Wellbeing**

- 4.3 Community Wellbeing was not only enhanced by the fall in crime and rise in detections, it also benefited from a range of proactive initiatives - often in partnership - across the operational divisions which addressed various aspects of anti-social behaviour. A rise in arrests for drinking in public places, prostitution and breaches of Anti Social Behaviour Orders, for example, could be attributed to focused police activity.
- 4.4 An innovative approach to anti-social behaviour (ASB) included the introduction in Aberdeen of a very effective early intervention process which saw warning letters sent to almost a thousand parents whose children had been involved in ASB. As a result, almost 60% of these children have not come to Police attention again.
- 4.5 ASBO applications included targeting individuals involved in city centre violence, homophobic violence and driver behaviour along with premises linked to drug dealing, alcohol fuelled disorder and prostitution.
- 4.6 Effective use of anti social behaviour legislation was also employed in tandem with extensive community engagement to address successfully concerns in the communities of Banff and Turriff regarding the unsafe and anti-social activities of 'circuit drivers'.
- 4.7 A new community engagement policy, developed over the past year, aims to improve community well-being by providing staff with a range of engagement mechanisms and a means of accurately recording activity. This will enable community opinions to play a part in setting local policing objectives.

### **Controlled Drugs**

- 4.8 Controlled Drugs and their misuse involve criminality and contribute significantly to crimes of dishonesty. The Force continued to do much in partnership to educate young people on the dangers of drug misuse.
- 4.9 Enforcement saw considerable success in drugs seizures with the amount of Crack Cocaine seized increasing seven fold to over 8 kilos. The amount of diamorphine (Heroin) seized increased by two and a half times and the number of tablets doubled.
- 4.10 The second half of the year saw Operation Blaven tackle drug trafficking by organised crime groups from England. As a result of the Operation, 277 persons were dealt with, 172 drug supply charges were preferred and there were seizures of 3.23 kilograms of Heroin and 4.11 kilograms of Crack Cocaine with a potential street value of £891,880, along with £71,626 in cash.

### **Road Casualty Reduction**

- 4.11 Road Casualty Reduction is an area of great concern with fatalities having risen from 53 to 62 and the overall figure for people killed or seriously injured on our roads was 271. Those slightly injured was 1201, below the 1326 target.

- 4.12 The continued road casualty toll is very discouraging in the face of the large amount of work done by the Force and in partnership to address the problem. In Roads Policing, the National Intelligence Model is now fully embraced with officers operating targeted patrols in known collision areas and focusing on those offences known to contribute to traffic collisions – not wearing seatbelts, speeding, mobile telephone use and drink-driving.
- 4.13 A multi agency approach has continued vigorously to educate young people who feature so prominently among casualties. The initiatives are many and varied and are tailored for age groups from under 5s to those about to hold a licence or who have already qualified. Driving Ahead, Driving Ambition and Safe Drive, Stay Live were among the projects which sought to improve driving skills and highlight – in some cases, very dramatically – the dangers of not driving safely.
- 4.14 One of Grampian Police's most regular partners, Grampian Fire and Rescue Service formalised its partnership with the Force under the banner of 'Road Safety Grampian'. This aims to continue the wide array of excellent work already being undertaken by both organisations and to provide an opportunity for future expansion. Both parties have allocated dedicated staff to work together to deliver road safety initiatives across Grampian with the aim of working towards the national 2010 road casualty reduction targets.

### **National Security**

- 4.15 National Security is an important priority in these times where the current UK threat level in respect of international terrorism remains severe. As such, it has been a year that has placed an increased demand on Grampian Police, including the necessary response to the national airports alert.
- 4.16 The Force has continued to review its counter-terrorism plans and has also progressed a new Force Major Incident Plan which uses new planning methodology and computer technology to provide the Force with a fresh and dynamic approach to major incident management.
- 4.17 The Grampian plan has recently been endorsed by the Association of Chief Police Officers in Scotland (ACPOS) Standing Working Group on Emergency Procedures which sees the plan as a template for a new ACPOS Major Incident Plan. This will mean that all eight Forces in Scotland will soon be operating to the same Major Incident Plan.
- 4.18 There was also publication of the Force Business Continuity Plan in compliance with the requirements of the Civil Contingencies Act 2004. The Plan, together with the establishment of a dedicated Force Business Continuity Team, will ensure that Grampian Police are well positioned in relation to this vital area of work. It has already been adopted by Tayside Police and Fife Constabulary as a good practice model.

### **Child Protection and Sex Offenders**

- 4.19 Child Protection and Sex Offenders are very much multi-agency issues, and extensive work has been undertaken to improve the efficiency and coordination of the partnership approach.

- 4.20 This approach has been underpinned by Management of Offenders legislation which aims to ensure that the statutory agencies work in partnership and share information appropriately to ensure violent and dangerous offenders are effectively managed in the community.
- 4.21 The legislation has seen the creation of new statutory bodies called Community Justice Authorities (CJAs), including the Northern CJA which covers Aberdeen City, Aberdeenshire and Moray as well as the areas served by Northern Constabulary.
- 4.22 Multi Agency Public Protection Arrangements (MAPPA) have been put in place, requiring the police, local authorities and the Scottish Prison Service to establish joint arrangements for the assessment and management of risk posed by violent and sex offenders. Health Boards are involved in relation to those mentally disordered offenders who are violent or sex offenders. A MAPPA Coordinator has been appointed to manage the arrangements, and meetings of the relevant parties have been established.

### **Serious Violent Crime**

- 4.23 Serious Violent Crime has raised concern with an 4.9% increase in reports from 999 in 2005/06 to 1048, though the average detection rate (65%) remained the same.
- 4.24 In Aberdeen, however, Assaults and Robberies fell thanks to pro-active operations. A longer term strategy to deal with serious and violent crime in Aberdeen centre was initiated, including partnership schemes with licensed premises and nightclubs and the reorganisation of the City Centre Police Unit.
- 4.25 A particularly challenging serious crime was the murder of Dean Jamieson whose body was discovered on Elrickhill, Aberdeen. Over 30 Detectives, supported by many operational and uniformed colleagues, conducted a three week protracted investigation, which resulted in two men being convicted of murder, a third of culpable homicide and sentences totalling 48 years.
- 4.26 More good police work was evident in the abduction of a fourteen year old in Huntly where the swift, diligent response from local officers brought the matter to a positive conclusion.

## **5. ADVANCES IN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT**

- 5.1 Responding to Scottish Executive targets, the Force increased efficiency savings by 96% from £3,064,787 in 2005/6 to £6,017,924. These included cash releasing efficiencies of £2,806,066 against a national target of £356,000 and non-cash releasing savings of £3,211,858 against a target of £3,137,000. Such savings have resulted in police officers being released back into frontline duties, thus increasing capacity to respond to demands from the public, whilst maintaining high standards of management and governance.
- 5.2 Among other financial achievements was the development of a shared financial system with Lothian & Borders and Strathclyde Police Forces; and the generation of £395,000 of income, through partnerships with external agencies.

- 5.3 Estate management was progressed with the lease of part of Woodhill House to allow 140 staff to work more closely together. As a result, several existing overspill accommodation leases can be terminated.
- 5.4 Joint development of shared premises has been a regular feature and a first for Scotland was the opening of shared facilities with the Scottish Ambulance Service in Alford. Agreement has been reached allowing Ambulance staff to use the facilities of several police offices including Danestone, Kincorth and Ballater, demonstrating real 'front-line' partnership in practice.
- 5.5 Community access was enhanced by the purchase of three mobile offices which can be used for surgeries in the Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire and Moray areas and also deployed as an additional resource at any major incident.
- 5.6 The year saw 118 new officers recruited, exceeding the 110 target. The Force also re-introduced a Police cadet scheme. Seventeen young cadets were appointed and have engaged in a range of experiences as well as studying for a new award, 'Developing Community Citizenship' which was designed by the Force and accredited by the Scottish Qualification Authority.

## 6.0 CONCLUSION

- 6.1 I extend my appreciation to the former Convener and Members of The Joint Police Board for the assistance and support that they provided to the Force over the past year and throughout their Board membership. I look forward to forming a productive relationship with the new Board in seeking to provide the best possible service to the public.
- 6.2 I also recognise the commitment of Grampian Police staff in contributing to the provision of what I consider to be a most efficient and effective Service Delivery.
- 6.3 Finally, I would like to pay tribute to the communities of the North East of Scotland who in a variety of ways have assisted the Force.
- 6.4 The Board is invited to note the contents of this Report.

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## **Force Control Strategy**

This section contains a summary of performance against the Force Control Strategy.

The development of a Control Strategy is part of the National Intelligence Model (NIM) business planning process. The Control Strategy is intended to produce a set of Force priorities for action and provide the basis for managing activity. The Control Strategy for 2006/07 was developed from a Strategic Assessment published in February 2006.

The Force strategic priorities for 2006/07 were:

- Child Protection and Sex Offenders
- Community Well-being
- Controlled Drugs
- National Security
- Road Casualty Reduction
- Serious and Violent Crime\* (SEJD Codes - 1, 2, 3/1, 4, 6, 14 &15)

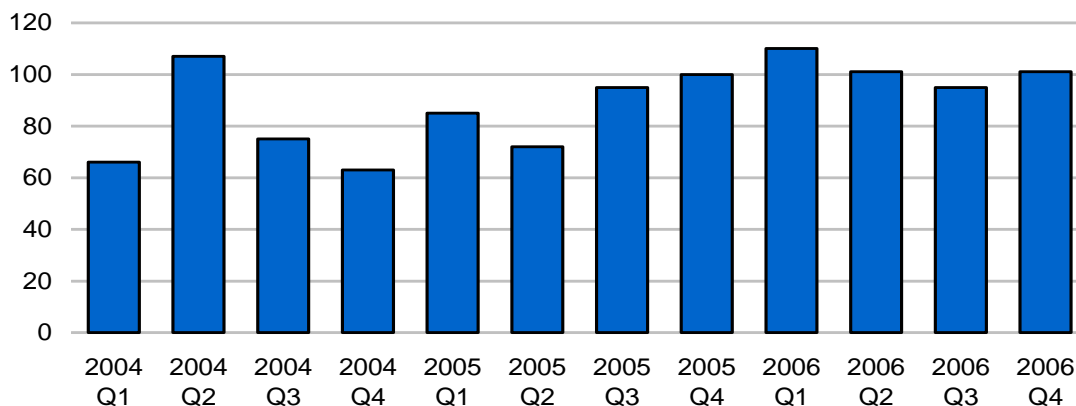
*\*Note that this differs from the Statutory Performance Indicator for Serious and Violent Crime which uses 17 SEJD Codes, hence will produce different figures.*

In addition to these six strategic priorities, regular scanning is undertaken in order to identify emerging trends and address predicted threats that may fall outside the current control strategy.

The control strategy forms the basis of daily tasking and coordinating meetings throughout the Force. Progress against these priorities is reviewed at a Force level on a four weekly basis. The strategic priorities are reviewed every 6 months to ensure they are still relevant.

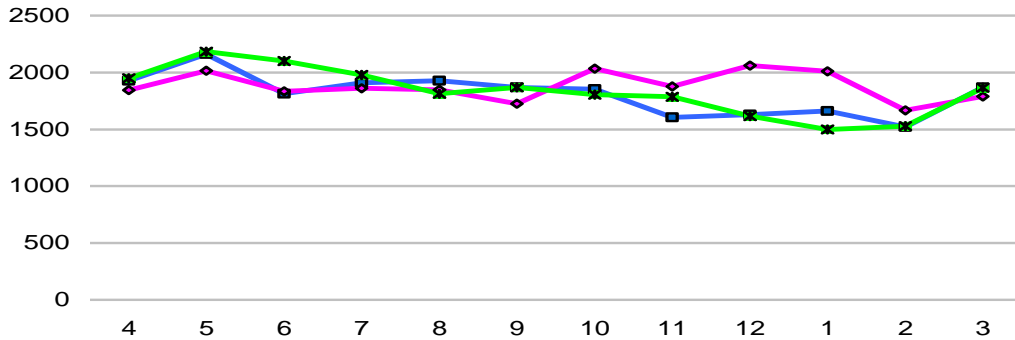

A range of crimes and offences are grouped together to provide an indicator of changes in this priority. These are listed above.

Child protection is very much a multi-agency issue, and extensive work has been and is still being undertaken to improve the efficiency and coordination of the partnership approach. The highest volume of crimes in this area relate to child neglect / cruelty, underage sexual intercourse, sale of alcohol to underage persons and offences relating to the provision of information by sex offenders. To put these figures in context, however, in each category listed above, the average number of crimes recorded amount to 2 to 4 cases per week across the Force area. Public demand for police services is largely centred on the investigation of child neglect / cruelty and sexual / indecency offences. Following discussion from the planning process for the 2007/08 priorities child protection will be separated from sex offenders as, although there are links between them, they are actually quite distinct issues.

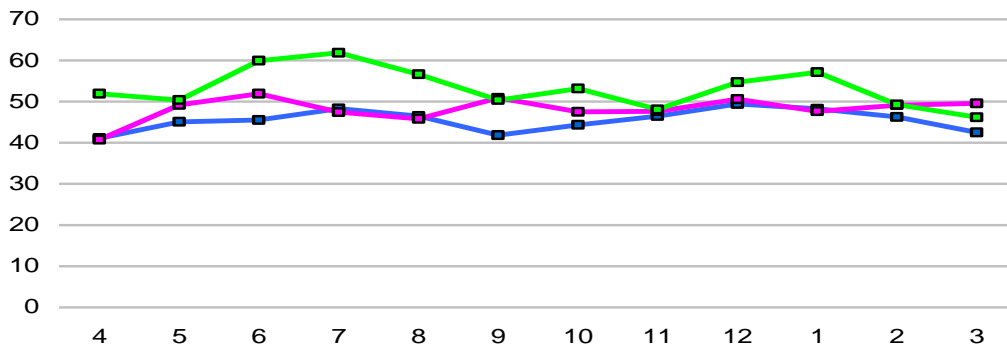

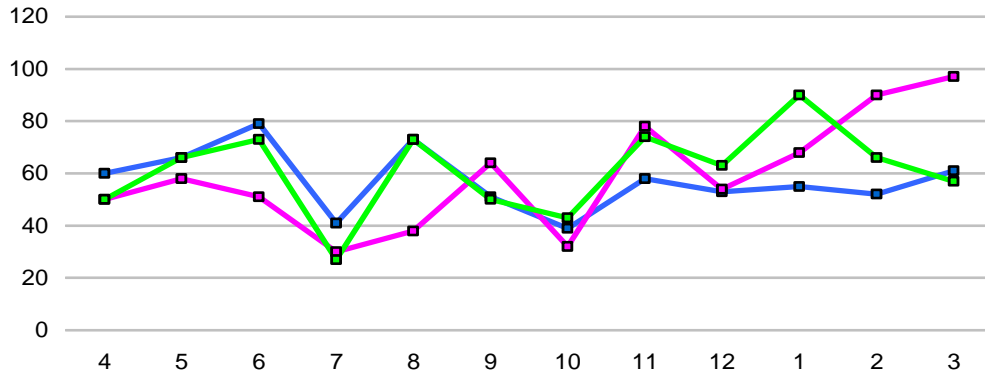
## Community Well-Being

A wide range of factors affect the well being of communities, many of them being outwith the control of any one agency. Grampian Police continue to refine the indicators which relate most closely to police work and which it is believed have the most significant effect on well being. These currently include vandalism, breach of the peace, some liquor licensing / drunkenness offences and littering. Of these, vandalism figures constitute approximately half of the overall totals.

Recent initiatives in all Divisions have been aimed at attempting to improve detection rates by the directed use of community intelligence and forensic techniques which have yielded good results in relation to acquisitive crimes such as housebreaking. Breach of the Peace offences make up most of the rest of the balance with low levels of other offences. Public demand for police attention is largely focussed on youth disorder / groups of youths, and continues to occupy the time of a significant percentage of police resources. The future direction of this priority has been the subject of considerable discussion during the planning process for the 2007/08 priorities.

Operation Blaven has concluded during this reporting period of January to March 2007 with enforcement activity having focused on groups posing the most significant threat to the Force as documented within the Control Strategy Priorities. The operation has resulted in the following performance figures.

- 3230.65 grams of Diamorphine recovered.
- 4112.61 grams of "Crack" Cocaine recovered.
- Total street value of Class "A" drugs recovered £891,880
- £71,626 cash seized.
- 96 accused have appeared at Court, 57 released on Bail and 39 remanded in custody.
- 277 persons searched.
- 172 supply charges have been libelled.
- 138 possession charges have been libelled.

During February 2007, Drug Squad Officers attended in London to secure the arrest of the principal and associates of an Organised Criminal Enterprise (OCE). This OCE were responsible for trafficking up to 1-2 kilos of heroin and crack cocaine to the Force area per week.

The principals and associates are currently remanded in custody awaiting trial and the details subject to subjudice.

This reporting period has seen fluctuations with regard to Force Supply charges reflective of Divisional performance. However, overall the year end performance exceeds that of the previous Fiscal year.

## Controlled Drugs

The seizures of Class A drugs during the year 2006/07 has increased substantially in respect of Crack Cocaine and Diamorphine in comparison to the previous year end 2005/06. The following performance figures reflect this.

Seizures Crack Cocaine 2005/6 = 1279.21 grams

Seizures Crack Cocaine 2006/7 = 8249.59 grams

Seizures Diamorphine 2005/6 = 3919.31 grams

Seizures Diamorphine 2006/7 = 10919.15 grams

*Both North and South Divisions have experienced a decrease of supply charges at the end of year performance figures in comparison with the previous end of year period. Significantly, South Division has seen a 42% decrease in comparison with 2005/6 figures. Moray, South and North Divisions have all experienced months during the Fiscal year where nil returns have been reported in terms of number of drug crimes reported.*

Elsewhere within the Force, Divisional targeting is focussed on Level 1 drug dealing activity and can fluctuate dependent on local operations.

## National Security

The current UK threat level in respect of International Terrorism is **SEVERE**, the descriptor being that *'an attack is highly likely'*.

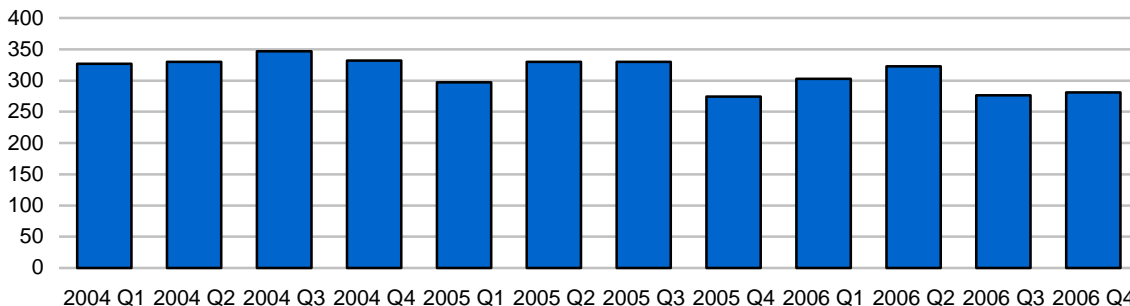
The current forecast in respect of International Terrorism suggests potential growth in terrorist activity, both within the United Kingdom and abroad where current predictions suggest this will continue to be a sustained and long lasting campaign. The ongoing conflict in Iraq and increasingly in Afghanistan, continue to give impetus to other sympathetic individuals around the globe, who seek to contribute in their own significant way. This is certainly the case in the United Kingdom and the Security Services and Police Forces throughout the country are correctly harmonising activity and becoming more corporate in their approach to identify and disrupt potential terrorist activity.

Within Scotland, this co-ordination is more focussed as a consequence of our willingness to work closely with each other. The majority of national initiatives are at a more advanced stage and target hardening of key targets has been achieved ahead of expectations. That said, significant work still requires to be identified and progressed in reasonably short timescales to ensure that our communities are as safe as possible from any potential future threats.

With National Security being a key force priority, the importance of ensuring an awareness of the current phenomena amongst risk identified sections of the community is ongoing, and a number of well attended seminars have already been carried out to achieve this. This level of activity will be increased and promulgated over the coming months throughout the force area to ensure that complacency in relation to the terrorist threat does not become a factor, particularly with the passage of time from the last attack on the United Kingdom.

The most significant development of the final quarter was the introduction of increased penalties for misuse of mobile telephony while driving, from 28 February 2007, and several operations to target offences and enforce the new legislation were carried out.

A Forum event was held at Pittodrie Stadium on 12 February 2007 to encourage partners to contribute to strategy in Road Casualty Reduction. This subsequently led to the launch of a joint GFRS/Grampian Police 'Road Safety Grampian' initiative to further encourage greater participation in this area.

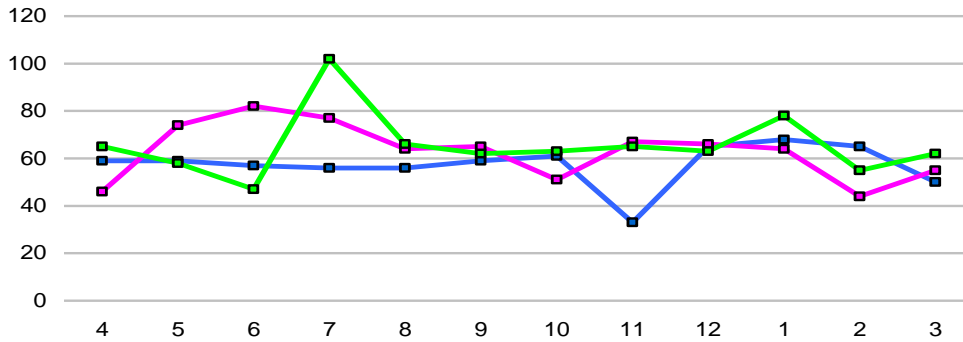
An ACPOS Speeding Campaign held nationally across Scotland on 6 February 2007, saw the Force report 69 speeding offences, 36 seat belt offences and 40 other road traffic offences on this date. Drink driving offences rose marginally from the previous quarter from 276 to 281 though remain below the quarterly average of the past three years of 312.

The deployment of an ARV (Armed Response Vehicle), from the end of the quarter, operating on a 24 hour basis has resulted in significant attention to directed patrol coverage across the Force.

A total of 7 multi-agency operations were held on 'A' class roads over the period, focusing on construction and use and overloading offences.

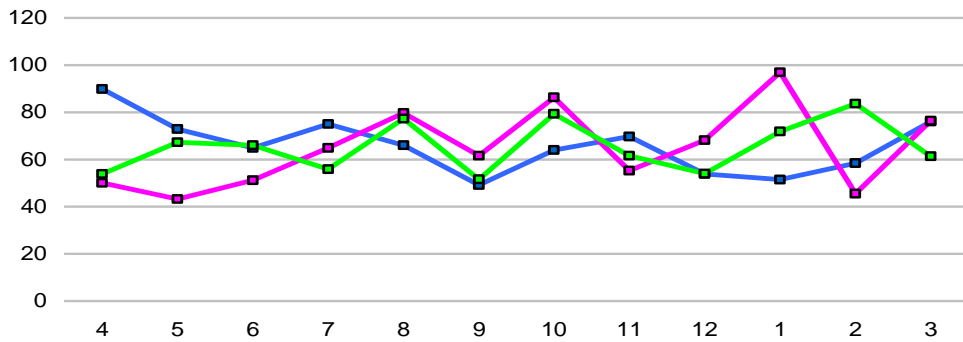
**Serious and Violent Crime**

## Serious and Violent Crime

Although Serious and Violent Crime across the Force has risen by just over 4% over the year, it is pleasing that the detection rate has also gone up in Aberdeen by over 2%. The Force has recorded the same average detection rate (65%) as in year 2005/2006.

Violent Crime (Murder, Attempted Murder and Serious Assault) continue to rise with percentage increases of 250%, 49% and 6 %. This may seem a dramatic picture but in terms of numbers, this equates to 45 crimes in total.

A number of specific actions under the 2007/2008 SVC Plan are aimed at tackling this wider issue of Violent Crime but, given the factors of alcohol and indiscriminate assault, it makes the targeting of offenders more difficult.

Sexual crime, including Rape, conversely has seen a reduction across the board with Rape falling from 111 in 2005/06 to 96, a 13.5% reduction

## 2006/07 STATUTORY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS - BASELINE AND FORCE ASPIRATIONAL FIGURES

### BACKGROUND

At the beginning of 2006/07, the Scottish Executive in association with ACPOS, agreed that the previous set of targets for crime base performance indicators needed to be reviewed. As an interim measure for 2006/07 only, it was agreed that the same set of performance indicators will continue to be used but performance will be judged against a new more appropriate baseline. This interim measure will allow time for a new set of indicators that more appropriately reflect the areas of performance in the Scottish Police Service to be developed for 2007/08.

Three areas were agreed:

- 1) To adopt a baseline of a three year average for 2003/04, 2004/05, 2005/06 for all crime based performance indicators.
- 2) To discard the existing set of national targets and, instead, to aim for continuous improvement from the new baseline.
- 3) Individual Forces are to set locally stretching targets in light of their own trends and current performance.

On these locally stretching targets the Scottish Executive state *"Forces to set themselves locally stretching targets which are robustly defensible in terms of Parliamentary, police authority and other scrutiny"*.

Due to widespread use of the Road Casualty target data, it has been decided that it would cause confusion and incompatibility of data to change the baseline for this indicator. It has therefore been decided that the existing baseline continue to be used.

### Baseline

A baseline for crime based indicators has been derived from the three year average for 2003/04, 2004/05, 2005/06. The figures for this have been taken from those submitted to Audit Scotland and existing data sources. A baseline figure has been generated for recorded crime, detected crime and the detection rate.

A continuous improvement direction will be assessed against this baseline figure. The three year average quoted within the report is derived from 2003/04, 2004/05, 2005/06.

### Aspiration

Grampian Police has set locally stretching 'aspirational' targets in light of their own trends and current performance.

For each of the crime based performance indicators, an aspirational target has been set for both recorded crime and detection rates as better than the **best** achieved during the previous three years. For example;

Group 1- 5 Recorded Crime

2003/04 - **39198**

2004/05 - 41000

2005/06 - 41569

Therefore the aspirational target is 39198.





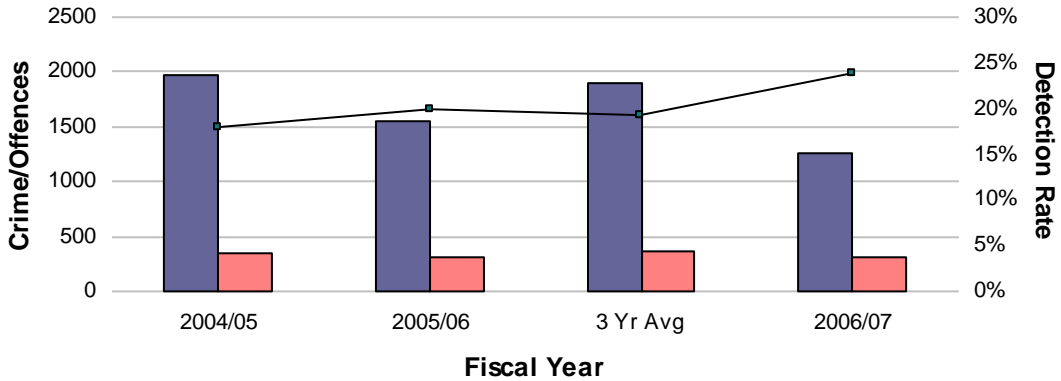

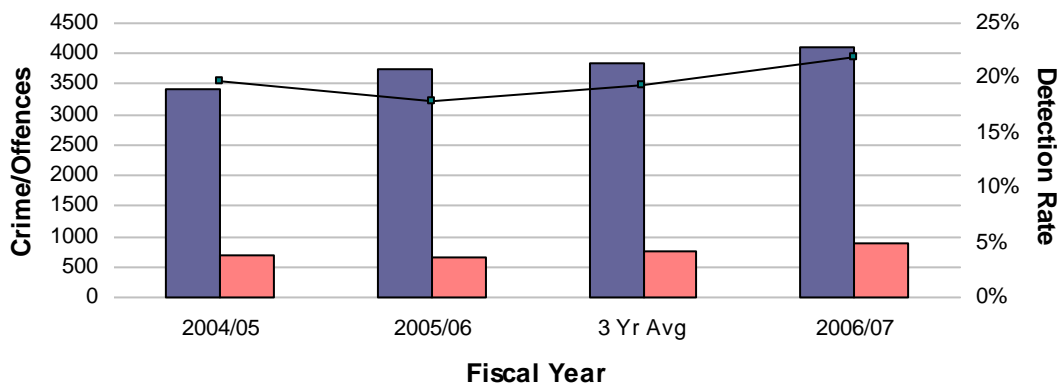

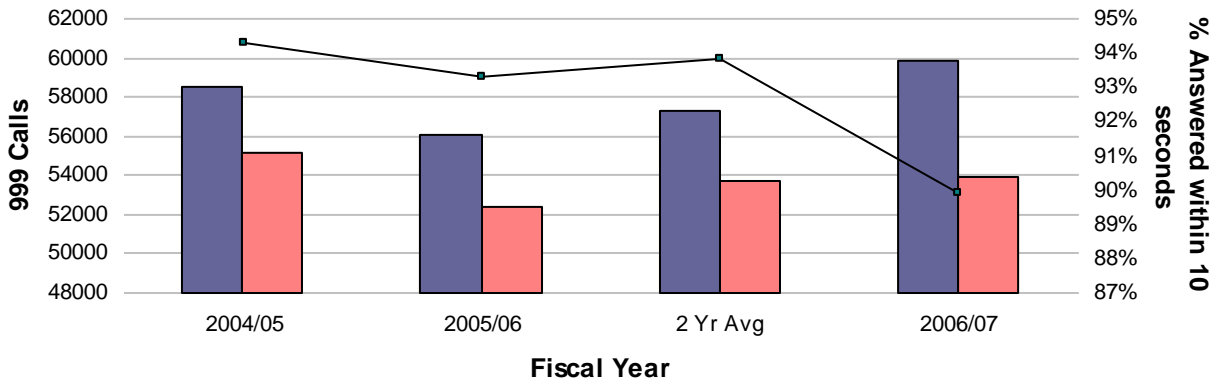

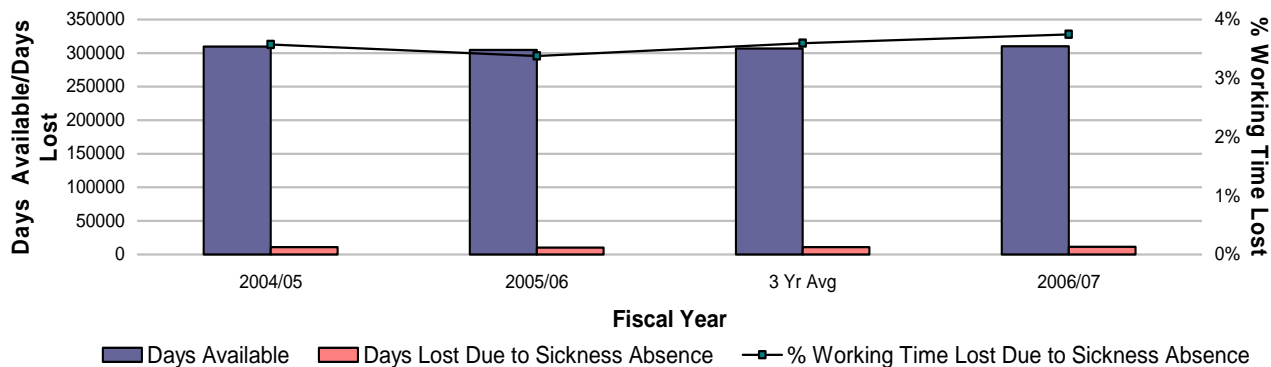

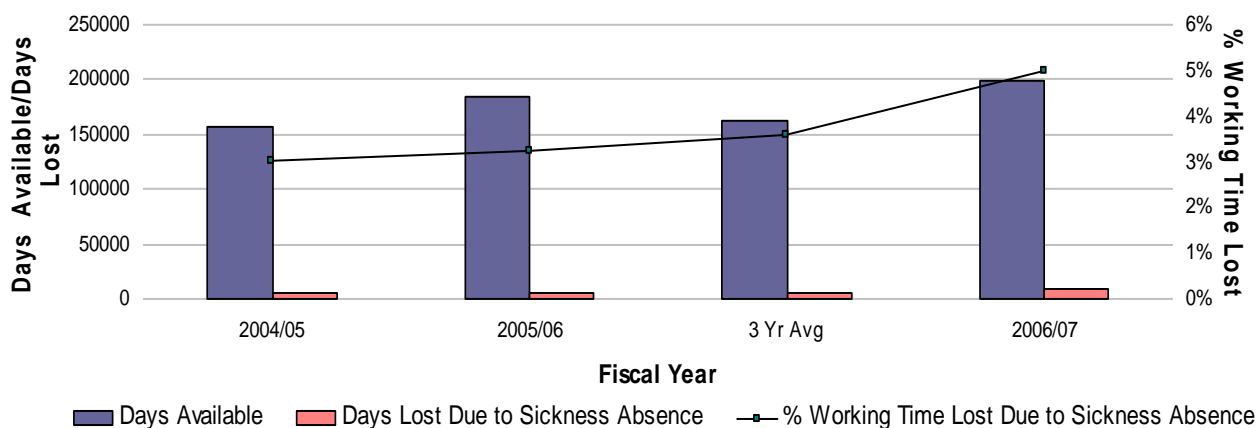

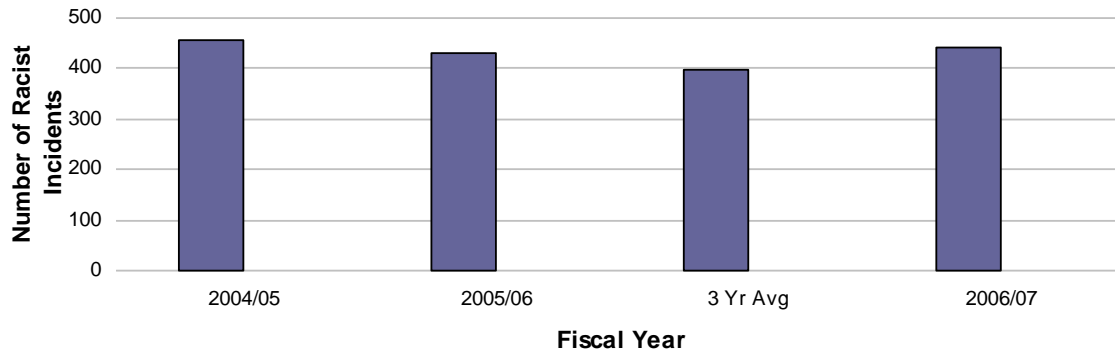

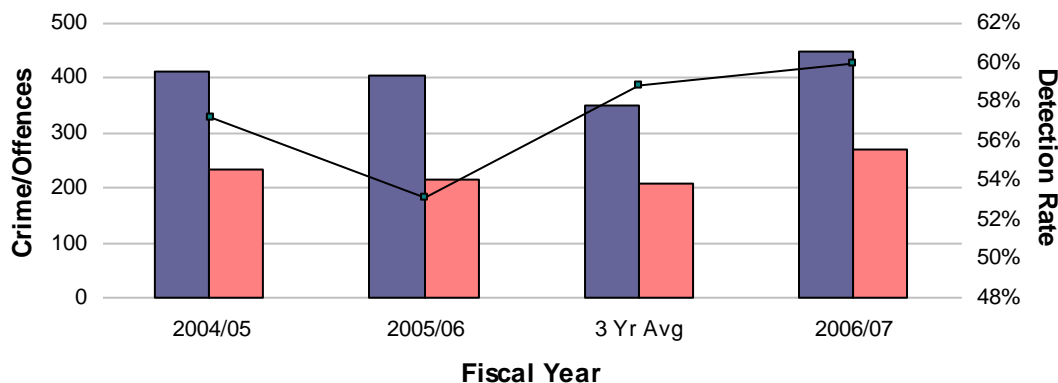

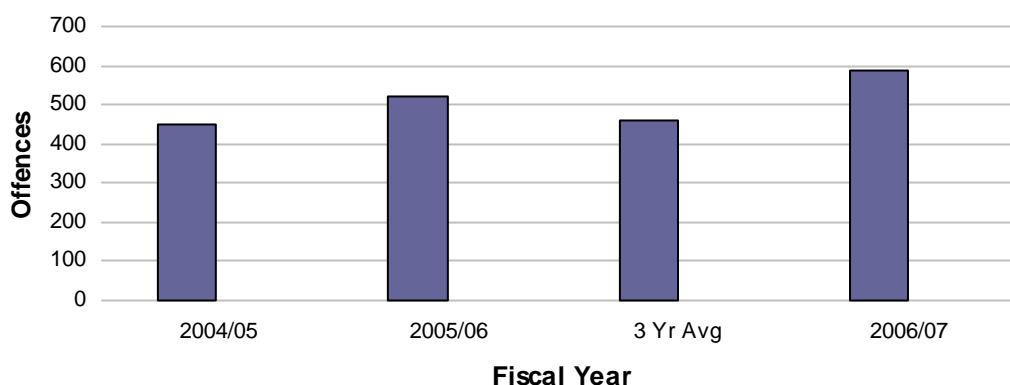

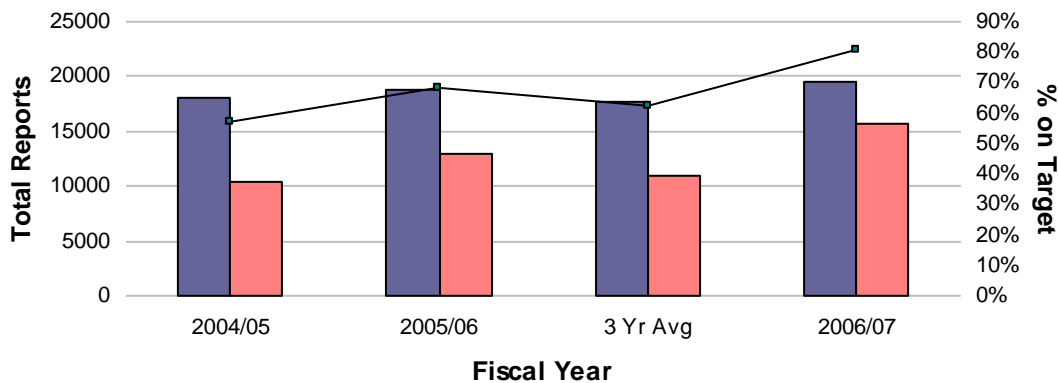
